The Constitutional President

Article. II.

Section. 1.

The executive Power shall be vested in a <u>President</u> of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, <u>together</u> with the Vice President, chosen for the same Term, be elected, as follows:

Each State shall appoint, in such Manner as the <u>Legislature</u> thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of <u>Senators</u> and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the <u>Congress</u>: but no Senator or Representative, or Person holding an Office of Trust or Profit under the United States, shall be <u>appointed</u> an Elector.

The Congress may determine the Time of chusing the <u>Electors</u>, and the Day on which they shall give their Votes; which Day shall be the same <u>throughout</u> the United States.

No Person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States, at the time of the <u>Adoption</u> of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of <u>President</u>; neither shall any Person be eligible to that Office who shall not have <u>attained</u> to the Age of thirty five Years, and been <u>fourteen</u> Years a Resident within the United States.

The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his <u>Services</u>, a Compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that Period any other <u>Emolument</u> from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the <u>Execution</u> of his Office, he shall take the following Oath or <u>Affirmation</u>: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will <u>faithfully</u> execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, <u>preserve</u>, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Section. 2.

The <u>President</u> shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Opinion, in writing, of the <u>principal</u> Officer in each of the executive Departments, upon any Subject <u>relating</u> to the Duties

of their respective Offices, and he shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offences against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.

He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make <u>Treaties</u>, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall <u>nominate</u>, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint <u>Ambassadors</u>, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the supreme Court, and all other <u>Officers</u> of the United States, whose Appointments are not herein <u>otherwise</u> provided for, and which shall be established by Law: but the <u>Congress</u> may by Law vest the Appointment of such inferior <u>Officers</u>, as they think proper, in the President alone, in the Courts of Law, or in the Heads of <u>Departments</u>.

The President shall have Power to fill up all <u>Vacancies</u> that may happen during the Recess of the Senate, by <u>granting</u> Commissions which shall expire at the End of their next Session.

Section. 3.

He shall from time to time give to the <u>Congress</u> Information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their <u>Consideration</u> such Measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on <u>extraordinary</u> Occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them, and in Case of <u>Disagreement</u> between them, with Respect to the Time of Adjournment, he may adjourn them to such Time as he shall think proper; he shall receive <u>Ambassadors</u> and other public Ministers; he shall take Care that the Laws be <u>faithfully</u> executed, and shall Commission all the Officers of the United States.

Section. 4.

The <u>President</u>, Vice President and all civil Officers of the United States, shall be removed from Office on <u>Impeachment</u> for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other high Crimes and <u>Misdemeanors</u>.
